

ABSTRACT

The crisis events change all the prerequisites and the conditions of our life. The proliferation of COVID-19 is a recent paradigmatic example of an ongoing crisis that has a social, political, and economic impact globally.

The workshop aims to explore the impact of such critical events on cultural heritage.

The morning session focuses on the economic impact of the global crisis by examining the events from different perspectives (e.g., supply chain and market disruption, etc.); further, this session highlights the effect of these events on protecting and enhancing the cultural heritage by focusing on a case study. The afternoon session consists of interactive modules – within a lab environment – including students participation.

The session will end with a roundtable in which the participants will share the session results.
